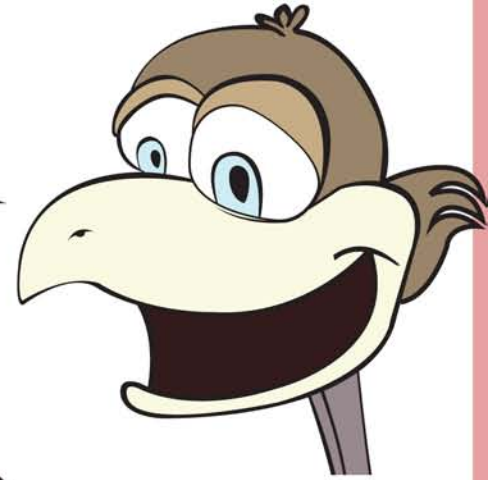

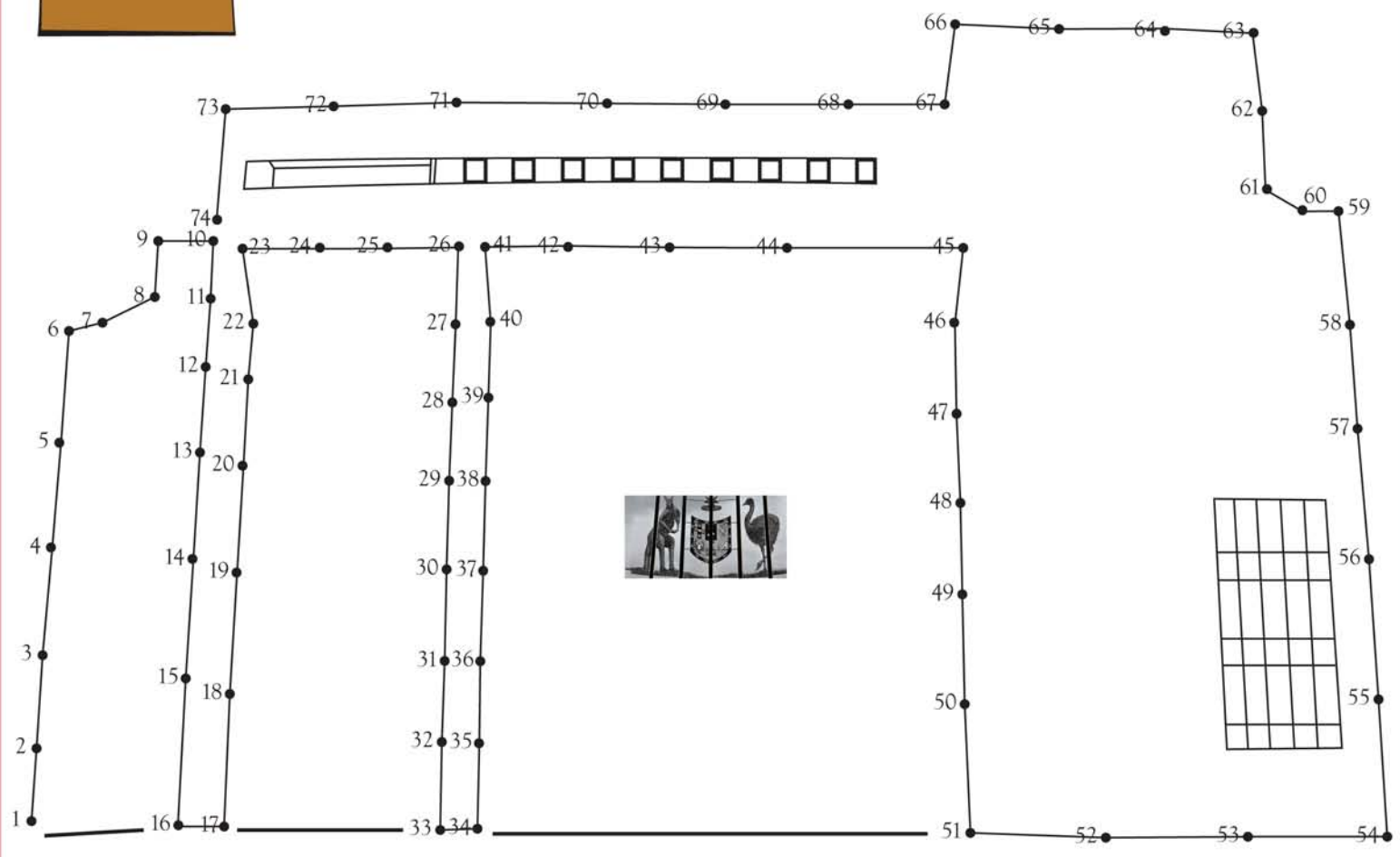

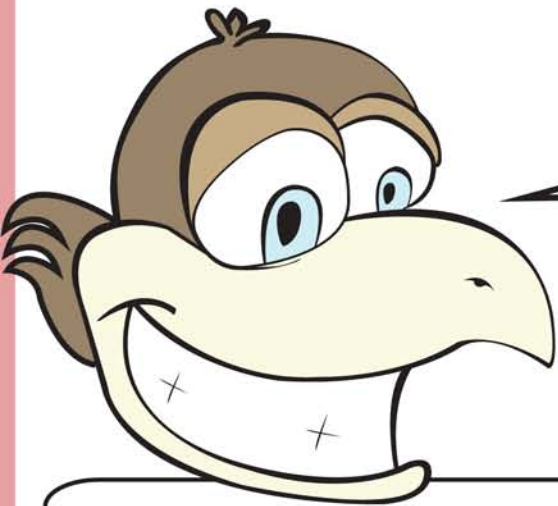

The High Court building in Canberra was opened by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 26 May 1980.

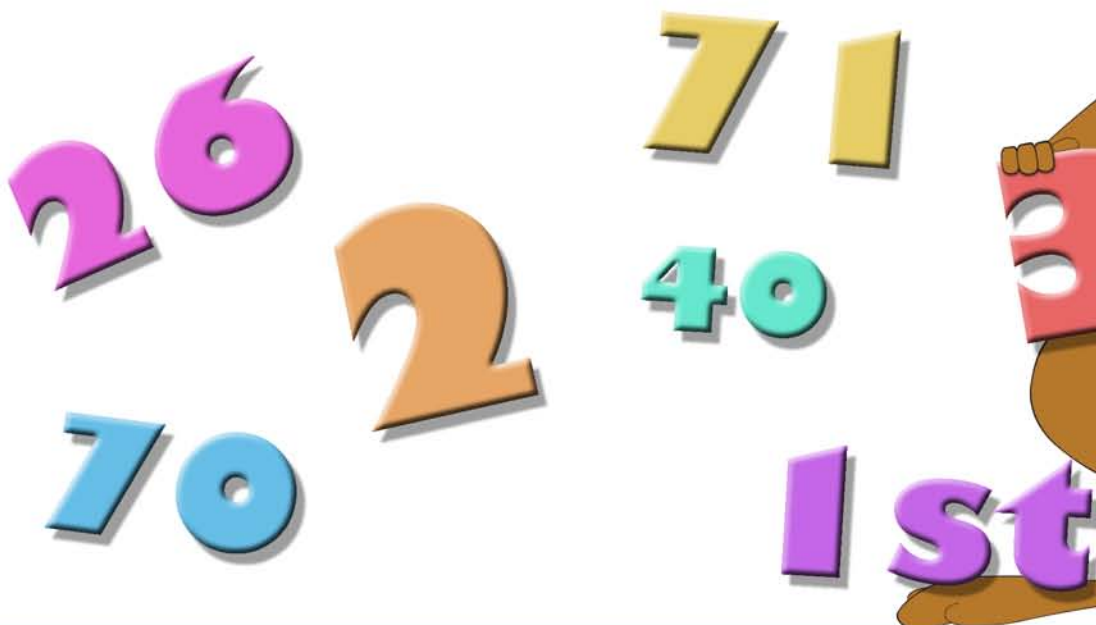
The High Court building in Canberra is 40 metres tall and is made mainly of concrete and glass.

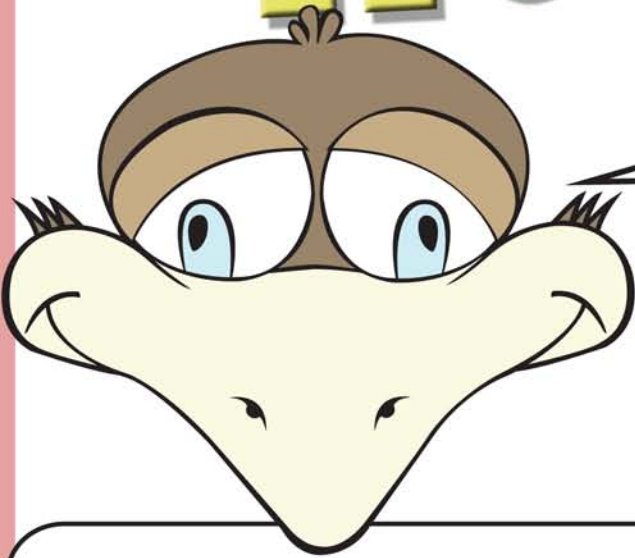

# Who Does What



There are many people working at the High Court of Australia. They all have different jobs that are essential to making the court work.

Can you help me figure out Who Does What, by connecting the people to their jobs?

High Court Judge

A qualified lawyer who provides legal advice to clients, drafts legal documents, represents clients in lower courts and instructs a barrister when necessary, obtains legal opinions or pursues matters in higher courts like a state Supreme Court or the High Court

Barrister

A judicial officer of the High Court of Australia appointed by the Governor General on the recommendation of the Federal Executive Council

Solicitor

A party defending an appeal to a higher court

Full Court of the High Court

Person who calls the public gallery of the High Court to order and announces the start of each sitting of the Court

Appellant

Person who does administrative duties and takes notes during a High Court hearing

Intervenor

A party taking an appeal to a higher court

Respondent

Attorney-General of the Commonwealth or a state or territory who is permitted to intervene in proceedings before the High Court that relates to a constitutional law matter

Court Guide

A qualified lawyer who specialises in arguing cases in court and who is 'retained' by a solicitor on behalf of the solicitor's client

Court Crier

An employee of the High Court who takes members of the public, including school groups, on tours of the Court building

Court Clerk

Any bench comprising two or more Justices of the High Court
